Membership Fee Policy - 2017

- January 1, 2017 all members and new members will pay \$30 which covers their membership to August 31, 2017
- 2. Beginning 2017 the membership year will run from September 1, 2017 to August 31, 2018 and following years. The annual fee remains \$60.
- 3. September 1, 2017 our new membership year takes effect and all members and new members will pay the annual fee of \$60 which covers their membership from September 1, 2017 to August 31, 2018
- 4. Anyone is invited to attend an activity <u>once</u>, free of charge. If a person decides to continue participating in that activity, without becoming a member, they are required to pay \$3 to The Centre each time they attend which is in addition to any other fees.
- 5. For people who wish to join The Centre and cannot afford the fees, you may qualify for free membership by applying through Panorama Leisure Centre's Life Program (forms available at CSSCA desk).



Stamp Corner

The Indians (First Nations) of Canada


When Europe discovered the New World in the 15th century, there were approximately 200,000 Indians (First Nations) spread across the vast Canadian land mass. In the woodlands of the East the Algonquins, migratory hunters and fishermen, lived in uneasy proximity with the tribes of the Five Nations of the Iroquois. The Iroquois, like the Hurons, lived in towns and villages and were farmers or traders.

Related to the Algonquins were the Blackfoot and Crees of the prairies. Life for these tribes centered on the buffalo hunt. A cultural distinction of the Crees and another tribe of the plains, the Assiniboine, was the practice of the Sun Dance, a religious festival in preparation for the hunting season.

In the great Northland from Hudson Bay to the Yukon River lived the tribes of the Athapaskan, the most numerous of which were the Chipewyans of the Churchill River. Farther north were the Yellow-knives, whose name came from their use of copper implements.

Probably the most sophisticated of the Canadian tribes were the North Pacific Coast tribes. Most of these tribes had an aristocracy, and the Tlingit and Tsimshian were slaveholders. Food was plentiful, the climate mild, and the decorative arts flourished. A unique custom was the potlatch, a lavish ritual gift giving whereby the wealthy increased their status. Most tribes lived in large wooden houses supported by great beams. The custom of carving these beams with heraldic devices evolved into the carving of totem poles, a 19th century phenomenon.

Canada Post honored our First Nations at numerous times with issues of a variety of stamps.

Income Tax Evasion

However the day is just around the corner, time is moving on and I must beat the deadline, otherwise I will be at fault once again.


Once again I bring out all of the income tax documents and start all over again to solve the problems of % in order to reach a final figure of what I actually do owe the government.

Press Release for Vimy 100/ Canada 150

During 1914-1918 about 1 of every four students and graduates from Victoria High School participated in WW I, about 1000 students. Their participation was as a member of the British Commonwealth under the leadership of Great Britain. At Vimy Ridge Canadians fought under a Canadian commander defeating the German forces that had withstood British and French army assaults.

This battle victory came to be recognized as an emergence of Canadian forces strength and a watermark in the definition of Canadian identity.

A number of memorials and commemorative plaques and shields were made to honour Victoria High School students. These still exist on the school walls and in the school archives.

Barry Gough, historian and author of "From Classroom to Battlefield" will narrate the school's and individuals' tories to students and the general public.

A seniors choir, the Songbirds of Brentwood Bay, and an orchestra will perform Canadian songs of WW I.

In Canada's 150th year as a nation this is a historic celebration of the youth of Victoria High School and their role in the birth of the modern nation's identity.

There are 2 performances on Wednesday, April 12: 2:00 -3:00 PM and 7:00-8:00 PM in the Victoria High School auditorium.

Funding has been received from the Victoria Foundation via the Community Foundations of Canada.


