Stamp Club







The Collector's Outfit

Before you commence to handle stamps, you need to be properly equipped. Stamps are delicate and easily susceptible to damage. Damaged stamps are generally worthless. The essential items for you as a collector should be:

Tweezers

Philatelists always carry rust resistant tweezers or tongs for handling stamp specimens. Stamps should not be touched with the fingers.

Hinges

A frequent cause of damage by novice collectors is the use of ordinary gummed paper. This is little better than the old harmful way of pasting stamps down flat upon the album leaf. It cannot be too strongly emphasised that only specially prepared hinges should be used.

Directions for Mounting

Fold over about a quarter of the hinge with gummed side outwards, very slightly moisten that part, and affix to top edge of stamp below perforation (the watermark is left in view). Holding stamp with tweezers, moisten to the same extent (not more) the other part of the hinge and mount in the required position on the album leaf. By following these instructions the hinges will peel off quickly, leaving little or no mark.

More popular at this time, are albums with clear strips or pockets on the pages, to place stamps behind for display, and thus are easy to relocate in the collectors album.

Thea Revoy
