# Peeling Away The Layers by Marianne Brackenridge

As a small group met downstairs at The Centre to explore ageing and sageing under the supervision / teaching of Lynda Miller, we began to feel a bonding within the group.

Much of the content was taken from Rabbi Zalman Schacter-Shalomi's book written two decades ago advising ways to view the ageing process as a unique opportunity and not to be bound or restricted to general concepts of the ageing process.

How does one view ageing? We have many thoughts, to some this period feels as though their past productive lives are over, so now time to relax. Others may view this period as a new beginning, with a sense of freedom, and time to explore other interests.

As was evident, we all have our own unique way of living through this period which I tend to refer to as 'the third trimester' in life. A time of 'opening', of 'a new beginning' and of reflection. Whichever way one chooses to describe this period in their lives, it is personal and unique.

It was so interesting to be a part of this Age-ing to Sage-ing group, as acquaintances, friends, or as strangers, we were all there to be open, to participate and to support. As the weeks went by, one could sense the bonding and the sharing as we listened and supported each other. Rather like peeling away the many layers that we have stored within our minds over many years. A sense of freedom as one reflects upon the past, noting our attitudes towards various important events that have taken place over many years.

This program allowed one to focus and revisit those past ideas and to share with others our personal reasons for viewing these events the way we did and how they impacted our lives today. In some instances it may be a time to review and change one's ideas. Some issues that were discussed are end of life issues, family responsibilities at such times, preplanning and health concerns.

The program allowed for freedom of expression within safe boundaries, supervised by Lynda Miller the coordinator of the Age-ing to Sage-ing program.

I look forward to revisiting with the group in January.

The class will be limited to ten participants to ensure lots of personal attention. Materials not provided.


