Even the McTavish Interchange looks not so bad – at least it doesn't have the Coliseum rising in the middle of it!

## Canadian Stamps honor the Establishment of Canadian Confederation

On July 1, 1867, the British colonies of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Upper Canada (Ontario) and Lower Canada (Quebec), joined in a confederation, the first in the British Empire, under a central government. The British North America Act, which created the Dominion of Canada, was passed by the British Parliament in response to the request of the colonies.

The idea of Confederation had been suggested many times before, but with the growth of the United States, Canadians drew together and Confederation began to approach reality.

In 1864, at the Charlottetown Conference, the Great Coalition Ministry of John A. Macdonald, George-Etienne Cartier, and George Brown presented a plan for Confederation. Agreement on specific proposals was achieved one month later at Quebec. In 1866 a third conference was held in London, after which the British North America Act was passed.



Starting on July 1, 1867, Canadians could elect a central government. By 1871 the new nation stretched from sea to sea. In 1931 Canada, long independent in domestic matters, achieved equal status with Great Britain in the Commonwealth. The Statute of Westminster, passed by the British Parliament in that year, offered legal recognition of Canadian independence, stating that: "Dominions are autonomous Communities within the British Empire, equal in status, in no way subordinate to one another..."


